THEY'LL SAY: 'SHE MUST BE FROM ANOTHER COUNTRY' (EXTRACT)

When I can't comprehend why they're burning books or slashing paintings when they can't bear to look at god's own nakedness, when they ban the film and gut the seats to stop the play and I ask why they just smile and say, 'She must be from another country.'

Her poem speaks of cultural exile and alienation and as the poem progresses her identity, race, sexuality all evoke the same response: "She must be from another country." Dharker provides us with a community of those who do not fit in, those who are 'outsiders.' Her poem speaks about how cloistered she feels as she doesn't perceive she fits in.

The poem speaks about the discrimination against people who are 'Half Caste'/mixed race. The speaker uses sarcasm to combat the bias against people of colour. During the event, Agard speaks about the negative connotations associated with darkness, he mentions that words have baggage and that dark is equated with sin. He says that "we are all subjected to our fears" and that for years people have always been afraid of darkness but it isn't something to be feared. He declares that "language is inescapable, it empowers you and defines you".

The Kahramanmaras Earthquake:

On the 12th February 2023, there was an earthquake that hit Turkey and Syria. They are calling it the Kahramanmaras earthquake. Its lasting impact has affected many lives. The earthquake unexpectedly hit both countries, causing despair and grief. The death toll has reached up to 52,700 by the date that this is currently being written and is still rapidly rising. The Capybara

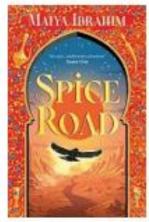

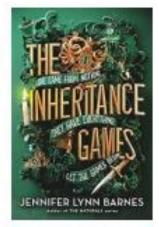










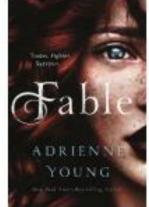


















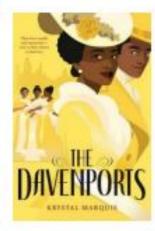


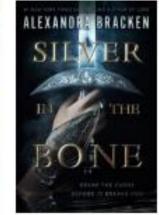


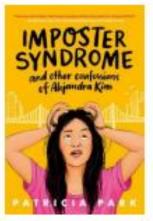










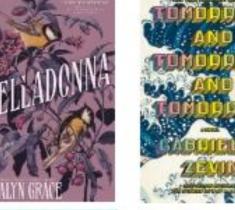


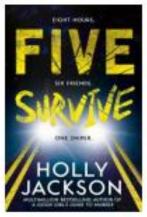




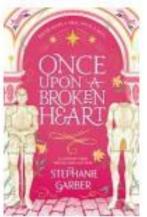


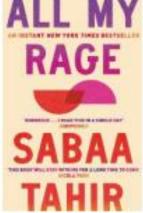


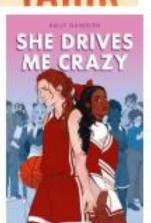




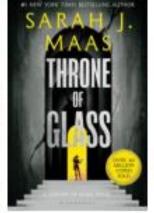




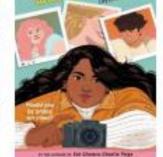














Strikes BY AIMEE

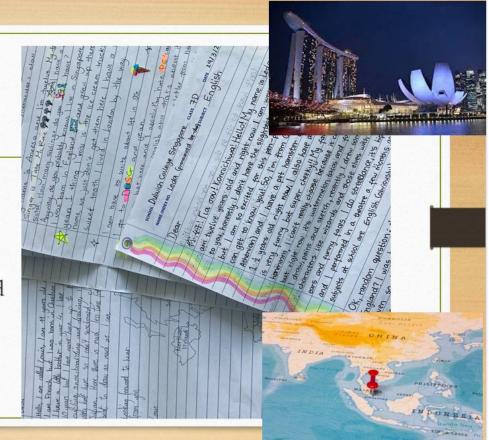

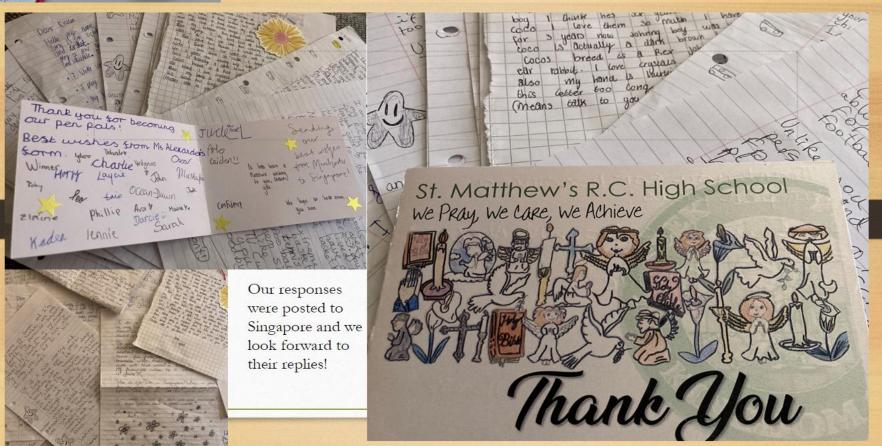

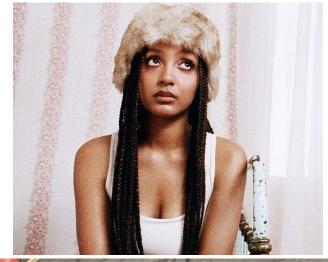
